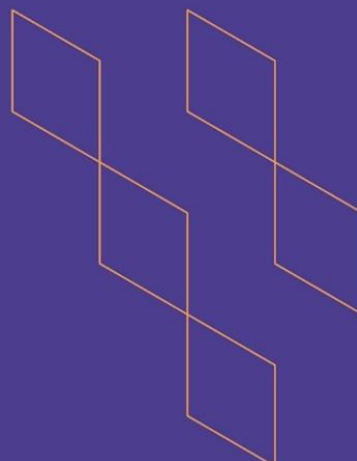

Instructors will have to focus on the most relevant topics/elements in each part of the required book according to the allotted number of weeks.
